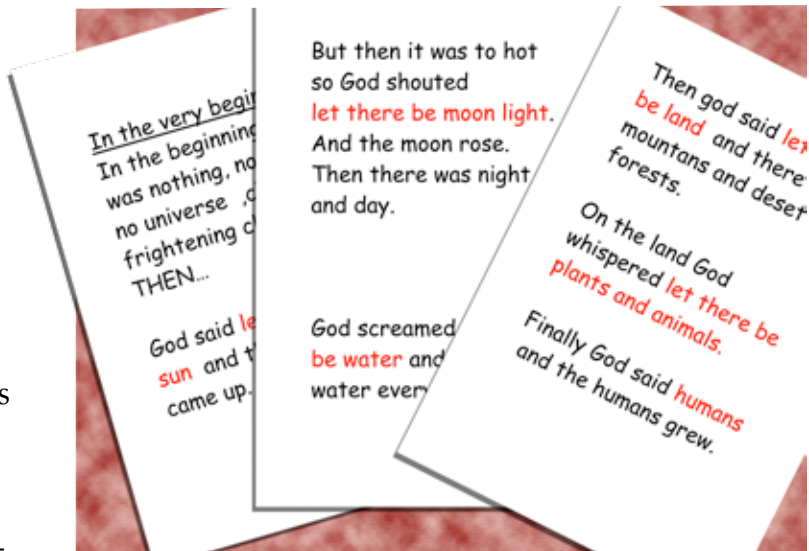

Stuck in Limbo

One of the first pronouncements Pope Benedict made was to announce that the Catholic Church no longer believes in the concept of "Limbo," the place where souls which cannot go to heaven, but don't deserve hell get stuck. He obviously hadn't visited Openshaw.

You might be wondering why we haven't sent out an Openshaw Connection for so long. Well, this piece of medieval mumbo jumbo might well explain.

It is now two and a half years since the first planning application for the Toxteth Street area was submitted to Manchester City Council. It is eighteen months since the City Council's executive committee approved

the idea of a Compulsory Purchase Order on the whole estate - including the church. We had been hoping that the City Council would buy the former GP surgery to enable us to move into it. For bureaucratic reasons they failed to do so. For even more bureaucratic reasons, they failed to tell us that this was the case until we dragged the information out of them almost 6 weeks later. That was back in June last year.

We have not been served with a Compulsory Purchase Order, so we cannot put in a formal objection. On the other hand, we have not been told that they have decided to build around us, so we cannot get on with the much needed

repairs to the building. Nor can we begin planning for a new building.

Last month we were finally invited to a meeting at which the city council began the entire process of considering the options available to the church again - some 8 years after we first had those same discussions!

Meanwhile, our work with the local community

is stretching our present building to bursting point. The Gentle Exercise class has blossomed and grown into a full blown 'club' for older people, even meeting when we have no instructor. We are in the process of expanding this to meet on a second day - which we would like to accompany with a full range of therapies as we do on Thursdays. Similarly, we do not have enough 'slots' available for everyone who wants a complimentary therapy to receive one. We would like to advertise the therapies more

widely among the community. The need is clearly there, but we daren't advertise because we would not be able to meet the demand at present.

Until we have some certainty about the building, we are unable to move forward. More than ever, it does feel as though we are stuck in Limbo, waiting for forces beyond our control. Yet we believe more strongly than ever that it is crucial that we remain here as a visible sign of God's love for this community.
